Introduction

Today is Mothering Sunday – it is also something called Laetare Sunday – which is known as holy humour Sunday. Today is also the first Sunday when we cannot meet together in worship in person because of the Coronavirus crisis – yet today we join our worship together in our homes and in our hearts.

Laetare Sunday means rejoice Sunday – it is also called Rose Sunday. It's the second time in the year when the liturgical colour is pink (the other one is when we light the pink candle on the advent wreath – which is called Gaudete Sunday).

You might like to find or put on something pink – to remember Laetare Sunday.

The pink Sundays are in the middle of advent and lent and are a reminder that the fun is about to come – they are literally lightening the purple and show us that the seriousness is soon to finish and is a glimpse of the light to come.

Today we need to feel this light to come more than ever as our world seems to be plunging into chaos and darkness, full of fear and concern. The light is to come and as we search for it and remember it we also remember that today is a day of celebration – to remember and give thanks for all those who Mother and care for us.

The Liturgy of the Word

Bible Reading Genesis 18: 1-2; 9-14

A Reading from the Book of Genesis

Yahweh appeared to Abraham while he was sitting by the entrance of the tent during the hottest part of the day. He looked up and saw three men standing near him. As soon as he saw them he ran to greet them, and bowed to the ground. 'Where is your wife Sarah?' they asked him. She is in the tent, he replied. Then the guest replied, 'I shall come back next year and then your wife Sarah will have a son.' Sarah was listening at the entrance to the text. Now Sarah and Abraham were old, well on in years. So Sarah laughed to herself, thinking 'Now that I am past the age of childbearing, and my husband is an old man, is pleasure to come my way again? But Yahweh asked Abraham, Why did Sarah laugh and say, 'Am I really going to have a child now that I am old? 'Nothing is impossible for Yahweh. I shall come back to you at the same time next year and Sarah will have a son.'

The Gospel Reading Luke 13: 34-35

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Glory to you, O Lord.

"O Jerusalem, Jerusalem, you who kill the prophets and stone those sent to you, how often I have longed to gather your children together, as a mother hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing! Look, your house is left to you desolate. I tell you, you will not see me again until you say, 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord'"

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Sermon (Mother Juliet and Izzy)

Jesus taught us through the use of funny stories. Sometimes when we talk about God we get too serious and we miss the funny bits. In our readings today we have some funny stories about being a mummy / parent...

Abraham and Sarah have been wanting a child so desperately but now old they haven't yet had a baby – their lives were full of sadness. But in our reading they are told they are going to have a child. Sarah laughs. They even call the baby Isaac which means laughter. The new life, the light in the darkness makes them laugh.

Sometimes laughing can help us. Have you seen some cartoons making us smile at our new reality of having to be physically distant from each other...?





We find them funny but they also tell us something really difficult – we don't want to be far apart from each other – it is very painful. Laughing can sometimes help remind us that things will get better. Sarah laughed – there is hope and light and new life to come.

In our Gospel reading Jesus says he is like a mummy chicken – it is quite funny really that Jesus says he is a chicken... He is also telling us he is like a mummy who cares for us which is what we remember on Mothering Sunday.

Funny stories help us feel connected to each other and jokes can make us think about serious things in a different way.

We have been asking you to share some of your jokes and stories and thoughts and reflections... sharing helps us to feel connected despite our isolation from each other physically and we have received some brilliantly diverse contributions.

Izzy shared a photo I'm sure many mums (and dads, aunties, carers and grandparents) can relate to:



And a few stories from Izzy (why do I find these easy to imagine hahaha) The time we were at a campsite shop and I said to Jon we should get a bottle of wine to go with dinner and then (little) Dorothy pronounced to the whole - very busy - shop: 'Oh YES! Mummy LOVES wine!'

On Dorothy's 5th birthday, I put an indoor firework on her cake which set off the very loud smoke alarms. I tried to turn the smoke alarm off, but instead pressed the button that starts our sprinkler system - which filled the house with foamy water spraying out of the walls - not my finest moment.

Sitting on the back row of an outdoor theatre having sent the children to sit at the front - I couldn't get there, because it was when I had broken my ankle. I wanted the children to know where I was sitting in relation to them so they could get to me if they needed me, so I shouted out Dorothy's name a couple of times to get her attention. Unfortunately, the show we were seeing was 'The Wizard of Oz' and so everyone assumed I was an actor about to start the show and everyone went quiet and turned to look as I waved at my children and slowly sat back down wondering what the sudden hush was about. (I worked it out later!)

Diane has shared with us too – it is particularly lovely to remember Diane's mum in a story at this poignant time...

Mum had me late, in fact 8 days after her 40th birthday!

She told me she was very embarrassed as she was the oldest woman on the ward and felt that the nursing staff had deliberately put her in the centre of the room so everyone could see her. She had to stay in for a week too but that was the usual routine back then. I was asleep most of the time so I couldn't possibly comment....

Richard remembers his mum (he says doing crazy things) bottling some damsons in a Kilner jar outside – she poured the hot damsons and their juice in the jar outside and closed the lid for it to cool and seal – unfortunately it was a sunny day and the jar continued to heat up and exploded covering the back of the house with juice....

Phillip cheered me up with a cartoon this week....

mom why dont we have any food?



We laugh at the stories and the jokes because they help us cope with embarrassing or difficult things – and we all recognise those feelings. Some of the things Jesus said were supposed to be silly ideas to make people laugh but also to make a point – for example Jesus said why do you see the speck (that is something tiny) in your brother or sister's eye but you don't see the log (the big thing) in your own eye – if you sort the log out in your eye you will see better... in other words Jesus used a funny picture idea to help us to stop looking at what other people are doing and to focus on what we are doing. The cartoon Phillip sent reminds us that people are panic buying – I expect we are all horrified by this - the cartoon shows how silly it is to over buy toilet rolls. But do we need to be careful not to blame others and check what we are doing too? Is it that they are panic buying, they are over reacting but we are just popping out to buy a few bits and bobs just in case...

Humour is very important in families. I think mums really know the importance of laughing – it helps us cope with the challenges and keeps us plodding on when things get difficult.

Having faith, being a Christian is a very important thing – and sometimes we are very serious – but we should also remember that laughter and fun is part of our relationships. Laughter and humour are also important aspects of our relationship with God and helps a loving community such as St Swithun's to bond and learn together. I would like to finish with two of our family who shared very thoughtful things for us to remember today...

One lovely person shared a song she used to sing on Mother's Day as a child:

M – is for the million things she gave me

O – means only that she's growing old

T – is for the tears she shed to save me

H – is for her heart of purest gold

E - is for eyes with love like shining

R – means right and right will always be

Put them all together they spell mother – the word that means the world to me.

Another wanted to share this with us which is a reminder that Mother's Day is not always straight forward for many and also that we can all care for each other — something of utmost importance as life becomes ever more extreme today:

By virtue of giving birth you are a mother - pregnancy being an overwhelming miracle and the baby being the greatest gift from God. Whilst this is known to be an unbreakable bond, we can be, sometimes unknowingly, fortunate to have others take on the role of a mum, which is distinctively different from being a mother. A person who is instinctively open, loving and caring to someone reliant and dependant on others. So thank you God for kinship carers and those that foster and adopt with good intention. Bless those who are surrogates and those who provide support in times of need to mums doing their best. We appreciate you.

So this Mothering Sunday – laugh with us and Sarah from our reading. New life is on its way, we can bring about God's care as God mothers us like a hen looking after her young. We can join together as a family and extend our care to those who do not yet know the love we feel together every Sunday. We can be together with God in spirit, in love, in care and in laughter.
