Today is the sixth Sunday of Easter (fifth Sunday after Easter). As we draw close to Ascension Day which is this week (Thursday) we hear Jesus in our Gospel reading preparing his disciples for him leaving the earth physically in a goodbye speech to them. As we hear this pep talk we can find support and encouragement in our own physical separation.

The Liturgy of the Word Bible Reading Acts 17.22-31

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, "To an unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For "In him we live and move and have our being"; as even some of your own poets have said, "For we too are his offspring." Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead.'

The Gospel Reading John 14.15-21

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you, O Lord.

'If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever.

This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him.

You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

'I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you.

They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me;

and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, O Christ.




Sermon Mother Juliet

Love

It is who we are: faith, hope and love. God is love. But what is love? What does love mean?

The Queen said on VE Day that our empty streets are filled with






What does love mean to you?
How would you feel it?
Describe it?
Envision it?
Experience it?

We hear in our Bible from 1 Corinthians 13 that love is many things – patient and kind amongst other qualities in a long list.

Today in our Gospel reading we hear Jesus telling the disciples, 'If you love me, you will keep my commandments'.

His commandments were part of what he was leaving behind for the disciples. They were part of his saying goodbye to the disciples.





We are approaching Ascension Day (Thursday this week) which is when we remember that Jesus leaves the earth. What Jesus says in his goodbye speech is therefore of huge importance for all of us who follow Jesus. At the moment it seems more important than ever as Jesus was preparing his followers for the physical separation which happened as he goes to heaven.

Physical separation is our church life right now.

As we continue to be church together - but at a physical distance – what can we learn from Jesus's message to the disciples, about living with physical separation?

Jesus asked the disciples to continue the legacy he was leaving - through living a life that he modelled for them and obeying his commandments.



But what were the commandments Jesus was referring to? We know that in John 13 Jesus tells his disciples that he is giving them a new commandment: to love one another as he has loved them. He goes on to say that this is how everyone will know that they are his followers, by their love.

We also know from the Gospel of Matthew that we should love our neighbours as ourselves – claiming it as the second greatest commandment, with our love of God as the first

I think we can learn more about what love means to Jesus in the Gospel reading through another aspect of the legacy he left us. He said to them, 'I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you forever'.

It is important to note that Jesus said 'another Advocate'. Jesus is the first Advocate sent by God to the world, to reconcile it, to love it, and to draw humanity closer to God through his life, death, and resurrection.

After Jesus is no longer physically with his followers, with us, the Spirit is sent to help us, to be our Advocate, to walk with us and guide us in the way of Jesus' love. To love is to be an advocate, to be a helper, to give oneself for others as we are given Jesus and the Spirit.



This definition of love is illuminated throughout the Gospels as we see Jesus helping those in need; and so we are to follow this by continuing to love our neighbour by being advocates and seeing others as God sees us all. We are to help those in need, to love those who are on the edge and to be a support to those who are not easy to love.

The Spirit was sent that first Pentecost and is still moving among and within us today as we continue Jesus' work of love in these strangely distant times. Perhaps now more than ever is when we need to feel that rushing wind of God's Advocate so that we can live in love as God's advocates and helpers. We are not alone in this task, despite the isolation and physical aloneness many of us feel, God's help is moving among us and within us.

As individuals, we can be advocates within our personal relationships: making sacrifices because of love for others; understanding and learning from those who challenge our perception of how we should live and behave; forgiving, being forgiven; and working towards reconciliation in our relationships. We can also show loving advocacy as a community of faith. We can advocate as a church by supporting those in need, giving the voiceless a space to be heard, seeking justice and peace.

I don't know about you – but at the moment I am wondering what is the best way to show love in the world we find ourselves living in

It seems that the church has to get used to being in this separation for a long while to come. How do we love as the body of Christ in this time of separation is a difficult question.

Let us now look at our reading from the Acts of the Apostles to guide us... It describes Paul beginning a sermon at the Areopagus, he says, 'Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way'. He then relates how he walked the city and looked carefully at the objects of their worship. Paul engages with the culture of the day to understand the context so that he can communicate more effectively something of the Good News of Jesus Christ.

As a church we are having to learn a new culture and find ways to gather in Spirit, to bring hope into the despair and to love as the body of Christ, despite not being able to meet in person. We are experimenting with different ways to gather as church, we are learning afresh and experiencing church differently and all of this is important for our faith however hard it is or uncomfortable it feels. Understanding the contexts we all find ourselves in – is key for communication... that is both church online and church through booklet deliveries.

Yes - we ache for that time we can gather in our lovely church building – but although the church building is a focus for our gatherings, it is the Spirit which unites us and helps us – this is our focus.

This week many of us have felt a little dispirited and so I sent some words of encouragement to you – to unite us in the Spirit... My encouragement for you all was a thank you – I wanted to tell you that I am so proud of the love you share, the care you constantly bestow, the checking up on each other, the generosity – for me personally it is brilliant to have your support and to know

that we are staying in touch and praying together in the best ways that we can. Thank you so very much to you all for your ongoing prayers and support, I know that I really am a very blessed priest in charge – I couldn't honestly imagine a better church community to be with at this time.





Gathered in our homes, in exile from our building, may we continue to remember that God, the Spirit is with us, moving and uniting us despite our physical separation; helping us and guiding us to be advocates and helpers and loving us as we strive to love others.
