Introduction

Today is a festival day – a day when we wear gold in church – so maybe find something golden to look at or wear to help you remember that we are celebrating a church party day today.

The Festival is The Baptism of Christ – our fist Sunday in Epiphany. After Jesus' birth and childhood we jump forwards 30 years to his baptism in the river Jordan by John the Baptist which begins the story of his ministry.

When Jesus comes up from the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him.

As we come to worship today, we remember that in our Christian lives, through baptism, we are children of God, we are beloved, and with us God is well pleased.

Today we ask the Holy Spirit to come to us wherever we are, in our lives, in our homes, in our community, in our church.

The Liturgy of the Word The Collect

Heavenly Father, at the Jordan you revealed Jesus as your Son: may we recognize him as our Lord and know ourselves to be your beloved children; through Jesus Christ our Saviour. **Amen.**

Gospel Reading Mark 1: 4-11

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark Glory to you, O Lord.

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather



belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Sermon Mother Juliet

So we are back to worshipping in our homes – and today trying to remember the gold liturgical colour of the Baptism of Christ – a time to party but if you are anything like me – it's all a bit like hard work – we are willing ourselves to keep going and to remember the good things – but if we are honest there is an awful lot to feel fed up with, or fearful of or downright angry at.

Take a moment to reflect on how you are feeling now we have entered the third lockdown...




Whether it is through gritted teeth, the gold that we wear or focus on today as we remember the Baptism of Christ is still important for us, perhaps even more than ever in these dark and difficult days.

In our Gospel reading we are right at the beginning of the Gospel of Mark and we hear about the baptism of Jesus and how his identity as the Beloved of God is revealed, remembering of course that we are also in the Epiphany season which is a time of discovery and revelation.

Through Jesus' baptism, we see who Jesus is, but we also begin to learn who we are as followers of Jesus.

In our baptism and ongoingly I hope and perhaps today we need to know that this is true more than any other time that same voice from heaven comes to us and says, "You are my Beloved."

Reflect – what does it feel like to know that you are beloved? Do you find it easy to accept this or do you need to actively remember that you are treasured and loved by God?



At our baptism we are named God's beloved daughters and sons – as Christians we are God's children.

God gives us the gift of the Spirit, which is the promise of God's enabling and empowering presence in our lives.

Now we are back to lockdown worship we are perhaps more aware of the Holy Spirit as we remember that we can come to God wherever we are, and that we know despite our physical distance, we are together in God's presence.

Today it is good to remember that the Spirit is with us – as the Spirit descends at Jesus' baptism.

What does it feel like to remember that you are in God's presence right now? How do you feel that you can experience the Holy Spirit?



So in these difficult covid times when we are full of fear, pain, grief, or uncertainty let us remember that there is always God's voice saying to us, whether we can hear it or not: You are my Beloved—my child.

My Spirit is with you. I am with you always.

The Baptism is right at the beginning of the Gospel of Mark as it is the prelude to Jesus' ministry. Blessed with his identity as beloved, Jesus goes off to fulfil his mission or his work. Today may it be the same with us – today let us focus on our gold party gear knowing that we are also blessed - knowing that our identity is as beloved children of God – knowing that we are surrounded by God's presence.

Jesus' mission is to bring God's radical love to earth.

Take some time to think about what our mission is as Christians today?

We are right at the beginning of the Gospel of Mark – throughout this year we will read more about how Jesus fulfilled the mission given to him by God. I hope these stories inspire us in our mission to love as God loves us.

Perhaps today we simply need to know that God's voice is always there, however drowned out by the multiple other voices we are hearing at the moment. Yes, life is so difficult at the moment for so many but please remember – that we are God's beloved, and we are in the presence of God through the Spirit. We are precious and we are loved.

Knowing we are beloved can change us and change our mission – when we are able to feel loved we are more likely to love others more truly.

Feel loved, and love others. Amen
