Gospel Reading John 2: 1-11

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John Glory to you, O Lord.


On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, 'They have no wine.' And Jesus said to her, 'Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.' His mother said to the servants, 'Do whatever he tells you.' Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, 'Fill the jars with water.' And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, 'Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.' So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, 'Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.' Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Sermon Richard Evans

Today we read the story that the writer of John's Gospel tells us is the first of the "signs" through which Jesus showed just who he was. The Gospel of John was last of the Gospels to be written, possibly as many as 60 years after the events that are being described. The writer had a purpose in selecting the events and sayings of Jesus to include in the book. To find the purpose, you need to look to nearly the end of the Gospel, in chapter 20, verses 30 and 31, where it says



disciples, which are not recorded in this book. But these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name." By the time this writer came to tell his version of the story, there would have been written records and a wealth of stories told about Jesus. John's idea was to pick out just a few miracles and use these to tell the story alongside the teaching about and by Jesus himself. The miracles he called "signs" and there are just

seven that are used in the book. Seven signs to help the readers of all time to believe that Jesus was just who he said he was.

Seven signs to point us to life at a new level.

In the story of the wedding at Cana we hear about the first sign of Jesus' identity. And "His disciples believed in him". As we come to think about the story again today, what will we discover about Jesus' identity? Will John's gospel have the desired effect in our lives as it did for the first hearers and for those early friends of Jesus witnessing the very first sign?

It is the story of a celebration.

A celebration lasting several days and involving many people from the village of Cana and the surrounding area. We have had almost a year when parties of any kind have been restricted, cancelled, banned.



Today I am asking us to remember different times and imagine going into the crowded excitement of a Palestinian wedding. Think about it. The noises, smells. Music, dancing, food...wine. It is worth making the effort to imagine this as it is not only culturally different and 2000 year of distance that we need to cross. Perhaps our year of pandemic life can be put aside for a few minutes to help us experience this extraordinary moment of history.

How does it feel to be at the wedding?

In the middle of the celebrations, the wine begins to run out. This would have been a disaster for the bridegroom. The provision for the party was his responsibility and insufficient wine or food would have been a disgrace that he and his new wife

might never live down. A bridegroom might even have been taken to court for allowing such a thing to happen.

So, suddenly there is tension. Jesus' mother heard about the problem and decided to tell her son.

How does Mary sound? Anxious, perhaps. She knew a bit about social embarrassment. She may well have felt worried for the young couple. Jesus' reply is odd "my time has not yet come" What does Jesus mean? Can you imagine having no expectations about what would happen next?

Imagine the noise of the party going on but you are part of this tense, anxious moment. Mary seems strangely confident. She tells the servants to do whatever Jesus tells them.

How does Jesus sound talking to the servants at the wedding? Perhaps he sounds confident as he asks the servants to fill up the six huge stone jars with water. I guess filling up the jars will have taken a bit of time. No hoses. The servants going to and fro to the well. Finally they are full to the brim. What now? Jesus is in charge again. "Take some of the water out and take it to the master of ceremonies for the banquet".

Imagine following the servants through the crowd. The astonishment on the steward's face. There is a lot to be said for a drink of cool fresh water (if you have some, taste it now) but back in the wedding, this is no longer fresh water. This is wine and it is really good wine. Try it. If you have some wine, or some other delicious thing; taste it now.

Now the astonished master of ceremonies calls over the bridegroom. "Everyone brings out the choice wine first and then the cheaper wine after the guests have had too much to drink; but you have saved the best till now." Apart from the fact that this was the first of Jesus' miracles, what was it that persuaded John to add the story to his list of signs? The signs are told in order to show us why Jesus was exactly who he said he was. I don't think this is mainly about an amazing, supernatural happening. In this story we see Jesus responding not exactly in a life and death situation. You might even say that the context of

the wedding celebration was commonplace. It was a big thing, no doubt for the newly married couple but in the scope of situations where Jesus might intervene, surely not a big deal.

Do we sometimes think that the things that worry us and keep us awake at night...do we think that God is not interested or needing to be bothered? This sign shows us how Jesus is firstly ready to be present with us in every situation and secondly that our God can and does intervene to meet our needs where we are. Can we relate to a situation where the world around, perhaps even those close to us seem unaware of the problem that is staring us in the face? Like the servants trying to avert disaster in the middle of the feast.

This sign shows us Jesus hearing the need, recognising the gravity of the situation. Understanding why the need is real despite the apparently lighter context. Our God can and does intervene to meet our needs where we are.

Do we understand a feeling when even good things in our lives do not seem to be satisfying us as they might? Perhaps this is the easiest part to imagine today. Life seems to be all anxiety and grief and constriction in the times of Covid. Even good things are spoiled and denied.

This sign shows us that what Jesus brings into any situation is better than can be expected: the best kept until now. Our God can and does intervene to meet our needs where we are. This sign reminds us that God loves us and wants to help us find that God provides immeasurably more than we can ask or even imagine.

Inviting Jesus to join the celebrations was the best decision that the married couple in Cana ever made. Not because of what Jesus would go on to do or because of who they could in future years say they had had at their wedding.

Having Jesus with us in our every situation is the best for us because it is with us and where we are that our God wants to reach us.

Fran and family, Lamar, Maureen, Karen, Paulette and their families, Andy and family, Philbert and family, Catherine and Alfrina and family, Betty, Fr Richard, Martin, Rossy and family, Kevin, Gwen, Pamela, Neil, Debbie, Elaine and family, Clinton, Francis,

Cynthia, Diane, Harold, Ivy, Sean, Taneisha, Talabi, Susan, Edith, Vanda, Lorna, Ena and Stephen. Transform our sorrow that there are so many people in need of our prayers. Transform their suffering and bring them comfort and relief.
