Introduction

Today is the last Sunday before Lent and it is also St. Valentine's Day – a day celebrating romantic love. St. Valentine was actually two people (who weren't romantically involved).

Both were martyred on the same day (c. 270). Feasts commemorating them were celebrated on February 14th. However the origin of Valentine traditions is not thought to have any connection with the martyred saints. Rather it comes from an early European belief that the second week of February was when birds began to mate. The idea suggests that lovers should probably exchange notes and gifts on February 14th in conjunction with what nature practiced.

As Christians, we know that love originates from God and that God is love (1 John 4:16). Today in our worship may we know that we are loved – and may this love change us as we prepare to journey from Ash Wednesday to Easter.

Gospel Reading *Mark 9.2-9*

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark
Glory to you, O Lord.

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!' Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them anymore, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.

Sermon *Mother Juliet*

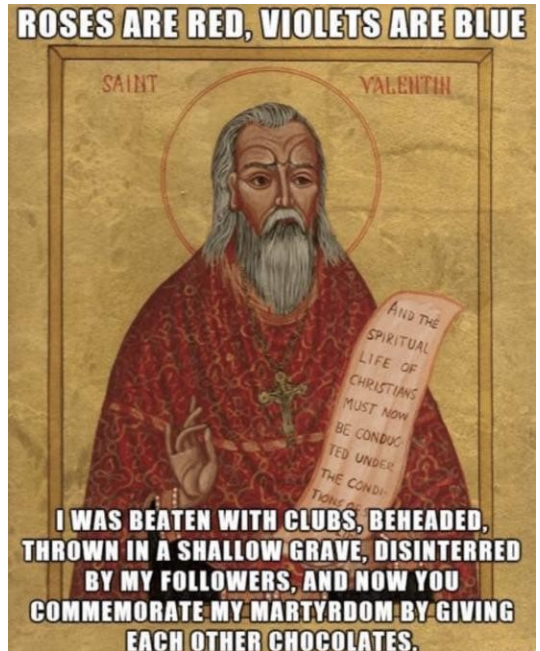
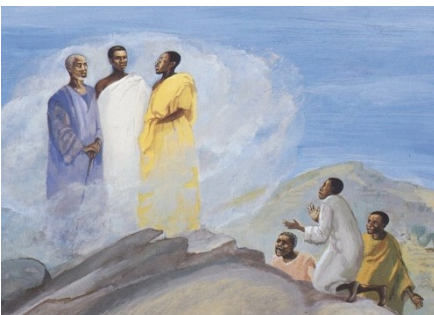
First let me wish you a happy Valentine's day. I know its terribly commercialised and all that – but I can't help liking a day to celebrate lurrvvve...

It seems unlikely that today's celebration of romantic love has much to do with the one or two martyred bishops called Valentine from early Christianity. This image sums up why this is unlikely....

It seems much more likely that we celebrate romance today because the feast of St Valentine coincided with the day on which

Whatever your experience of romantic love today – rather brilliantly - we have another reminder that we are beloved...

In addition to being St. Valentine's day today it is also the last Sunday before Lent and the Gospel reading from Mark that we have just heard, is an account of the transfiguration of Jesus. Jesus went up on a mountain to pray and he took with him three of his closest

disciples - Peter, James and John. While Jesus was praying his appearance changed and his clothes became dazzling white – I love the added description – such as no one on earth could bleach them. Proper whiter than white whiteness... glowy stuff. Reminds me of the snow earlier in the week – starts all glowy and then becomes a bit sludgy ... but that first snow dazzliness is what we are reminded of....

Apart from washing powder adverts does this description of dazzling whiteness link you to any other dazzling white descriptions you can think of?



One of the things I was reminded of (probably because of the delights of this week's snow in my mind at the moment) was the angels who appeared after the resurrection - Matt 28:2 'His appearance was like lightning and his clothes were as white as snow'.

Of course this doesn't mean that Jesus was an angel but it points our minds forward towards the events of the resurrection and, of course, to the divine nature of Jesus.

At the transfiguration - we also have Moses and Elijah joining the party - also shining in glory and speaking to Jesus about what he was soon to do in Jerusalem. Of course both Moses and Elijah were hugely important figures in Judaism and it is interesting that their appearance with Jesus gives him this link to Jewish heritage authority but we are also pointed to Jesus going beyond that authority – as we hear the voice of God saying to Jesus – 'this is my Son, the Beloved, listen to him!'

Only last month we remembered how Jesus - and all of us through baptism - are beloved as we explored Jesus' baptism in the river Jordan.



Today we hear it again – beloved... such a lovely and profoundly important thing to remember that we are beloved on this national day of love... red roses and cards are nice – I love it all – but this kind of deep love, beloved-ness is cause for celebration every day. We are all beloved.

So this slightly crazy story and wonderful snowy white imaged story of the transfiguration points us forward to Jesus' resurrection and gives us a flavour of his divine nature, and it also reminds us of his baptism. This story also tells us that Jesus is both connected with the Jewish tradition and yet is something entirely new that goes beyond Moses and Elijah.

The transfiguration is a point of change – a connection with the old and the traditional and the movement towards the new... Which is probably why it is the chosen reading for the Sunday before Lent. The point at which we are all getting ready to keep Lent in some way.

I love that today the Sunday before Lent is also Valentine's Day – this day of love – because it is a day to remember again that we are beloved. As we think about this transfiguration – it is important to remember that it is love which changes us – love from our creation and our beginning and love as we journey towards new birth and new life – love – God's love transfigures us, God's love changes us.

So we are now looking towards Lent – this week we have Ash Wednesday (we will have a short zoom service at 8pm if any

want to join us) – and we will be starting together our Lenten pilgrimage to Easter. The point of any pilgrimage is not just to arrive at the destination, but also to engage with the process of change along the way. As Christians we are always moving and in constant process ... we tread the path of constantly aligning ourselves with God's love.

What will your Lenten action be I wonder?



Lent should not be about self-punishment self-hatred and denial – it is about being profoundly and deeply loved – beloved. Lent is about aligning ourselves in God's love – so what beautiful and lovely thing can you do this Lent to feel that you are beloved and valued and precious... it doesn't necessarily mean it should be easy – sacrifice if done well and with loving intention can bring about incredible transformation. Just think about the wonderful world of health and fitness – it's a gift to make yourself feel good and healthy – but it isn't necessarily easy...

Loving ourselves can mean giving up things we like because it helps us to be more healthy in body mind and soul... If giving up chocolate connects you to feeling beloved of God and draws you closer to God's love - and helps you to show yourself how lovely you are in God's image – then it is indeed a good Lenten discipline – however if it is simply a punishment for enjoying the sweet stuff – then it is definitely not a good idea.

I hope that you can reflect on something for Lent that is profoundly loving – something new or stopping something that is harmful or helps you reflect more about yourself, your community. Whatever we choose to do – we need to actively change as we journey with God. What can you do to draw closer to God's love day by day, remembering that we are all beloved.
